# White Collar Investigation and Enforcement: A U.S./Canada Comparison on Recent Trends

With an increase in enforcement against white collar offenses, as well as the proposed implementation of a DPA regime, Canada is moving closer to the U.S. model of white collar investigation and enforcement. This said, salient differences remain between the two jurisdictions. Our panel will explore those differences with particular emphasis on their impact during cross-border white collar matters.
